

Today's Hymns

Each of the hymns featured in today's service has a strong Canadian origins.

Jesus, wondrous Saviour, is the McMaster University hymn and was written by Thomas Hastings who was born in 1792 outside Ottawa in the village of Osgoode, Ontario. He was converted to the Christian faith at the age of 20 under the ministry of the Canadian Baptist preacher, John Gilmour. He graduated from the Baptist college in Woodstock, Ontario and later the University of Toronto and later joined the faculty of Toronto Baptist College in 1886, which would later become McMaster College and McMaster University. In 1889 he was appointed Principal. Shortly after this appointment he suffered a form of paralysis and was confined to bed for more than six months before being taken to New York City for surgery, which proved unsuccessful. He died in New York City and is buried in Mount Pleasant Cemetery. He had written Jesus, wondrous Saviour in Advent of 1889.

I Do Not Know Tomorrow's Way was written by Margaret Clarkson, (1915 - 2008). Margaret was born in Melville, Saskatchewan, but grew up in Toronto, and was educated at Riverdale Collegiate

Institute, Toronto Teachers' College, and the University of Toronto. For 38 years she taught elementary school in Ontario. She published hundreds of poems, articles, songs and sketches, and 17 books in 7 languages. Hymn writing was her first love, and sprang from a lifetime of Bible study, personal Christian experience, and a disciplined lyrical expression. For many years Margaret Clarkson attended weekly services here at Yorkminster Park.

What A Friend We Have In Jesus was written by Joseph M. Scriven. He was born in County Down, Ireland, in 1819 and died at Rice Lake in the Kawarthas in 1886. Scriven was an Irish immigrant to Canada and wrote this text to this most beloved hymn near Port Hope. Ontario, in 1855. The words were born of Scriven's many trials and sorrows. Scriven often needed the solace of the Lord as described in his famous hymn. Educated at Trinity College, Dublin, Ireland, Scriven enrolled in a military college to prepare for an army career. However, poor health prevented him from pursuing his dream. In 1844 his fiancée died in a drowning accident on the eve of their wedding. Later that year he moved to Ontario, where he taught school in Woodstock and Brantford before moving to Port Hope. His plans for marriage were dashed again when his new bride-to-be died after a short illness in 1855. In that same year Scriven received word that his mother was dying in Ireland. To comfort her soul he wrote a poem, The Divine Friend, Jesus Christ, who sees us through life's struggles. In the years that followed Scriven tried to live according to the Sermon on the Mount as literally as possible, giving and sharing all he had and often doing menial tasks for the poor and physically disabled. During a serious illness in 1886 he sought relaxation and recovery at a friend's cottage on Rice Lake. Sadly, Scriven drowned in Rice Lake where to this day there is a monument in his honour. The poem Scriven wrote to his mother was discovered and published in a newspaper listing the author as unknown. The American composer, Charles Converse, set it to music in 1866 and the hymn was born, but the author was not identified till the 1880's. Today it is one of the most beloved Christian hymns in the world.

Go to the World was written by Sylvia Dunstan. Sylvia was born in Simcoe, Ontario and attributed her love of music to her grandparents who had both Methodist and Salvation Army backgrounds. In her youth she studied music at a nearby convent through which she met the folk hymn writer, Sister Miriam Theresa Winter, who encouraged her to put scripture to music. As she developed as a hymn writer, she focussed her energy on writing the words rather than the music. After graduating from York University, Sylvia earned degrees in both theology and divinity from Emmanuel College at the University of Toronto. In 1980, she was ordained by the Hamilton Conference of the United Church of Canada. She served as a parish minister, a prison chaplain at the maximum-security women's prison in Whitby, and editor of a Canadian worship resource journal, Gathering. She wrote this particular hymn for her mentor, Allan Barthel, when she was made aware that he was looking for a commissioning hymn for a graduation ceremony the next day. A collection of forty of her hymns was published, but tragically she died of liver cancer in 1993 at the young age of 38 and was buried at the Toronto Necropolis Cemetery.

O Canada. Our National Anthem was originally commissioned by Lieutenant Governor of Quebec Théodore Robitaille for the 1880 Saint-Jean-Baptiste Day ceremony; Calixa Lavallée composed the

were originally in French; an English version was created in 1906. Robert Stanley Weir wrote in 1908 another English version, which is the official and most popular version, one that is not a literal translation of the French. Weir's lyrics have been revised twice, taking their present form in 1980, but the French lyrics remain unaltered. "O Canada" had served as a de facto national anthem since 1939, officially becoming Canada's national anthem in 1980 when the Act of Parliament making it so received royal assent and became effective on July 1 as part of that year's Dominion Day (now known as Canada Day) celebrations.
