

Wednesday Evening Online Bible Study led by Paula Willis and Peter Holmes

The study begins on Wed. October 5th at 7 p.m. and will continue through the fall season. This fall, our study is based on Bruce Neal's most recent book, Water, Wind and Life Defining Word: A Baptist Bruce Neal served as the Minister of Testimony. Christian Education at Yorkminster Park from 1961 to 1965 and was our only minister for much of that time. Bruce went on to serve Baptist churches in Hamilton, Toronto and Mississauga. He served as President of Canadian Baptist Ministries and played a crucial role in the formation of our denomination's relief and development work. In an age where there is much confusion about what Baptists stand for, in this book Bruce calls us back to the best of who we As one who has made an important are. contribution to ecumenism in this country, Bruce's book will offer wisdom to people of all Christian traditions and we hope our discussions will be strengthened as they usually are by participants from other denominations.

The chapters of the book look at faith, church, baptism, communion, the Bible, worship, freedom, mission and ordination; topics of interest to all Christians.

The LRPF was founded by Yorkminster Park in 1987 in response to a vision of the Rev. Dr. John N. Gladstone and Gerrard Collins. This year's event takes place from Sunday, October 23 through Tuesday, October 25. The Sunday evening and Monday evening sessions are open to the public.

On Sunday morning we will have the privilege of welcoming The Rev. Becca Stevens of Nashville to

our pulpit. Becca Stevens is not only a renowned preacher, but also the founder of the remarkable Thistle Farms which brings healing, hope and employment for women survivors of trafficking, prostitution and addiction.

On Sunday evening, Rev. Dr. Ray Aldred, an Indigenous theologian and professor from Vancouver will preach followed by a panel discussion featuring our keynote speakers. On Monday evening, the Episcopal Bishop of Atlanta, the Most Rev. Robert Wright, will preach followed by a concert featuring the Toronto Mass Choir, a gospel choir conducted by Karen Burke.





Do you know the signs of a heart attack or stroke?

By acting quickly in a heart attack or stroke events, we can reduce the amount of heart damage and permit the use of thrombolytic or fibrinolytic therapy, which reduces the damage to the heart muscle or the interruption of blood to the brain. Recognizing the signs and symptoms, seeking proper and prompt medical help, may prevent a sudden cardiac arrest.





MISSIONS UPDATE

Central America and Bolivia

September 2022 Update from our partners in CBM Bill and Janice Dyck who serve the people of Central America and Bolivia

Face to Face with Pastors

Even via Zoom it had been possible to begin a Discipleship and Pastoring of Pastors (DPP) group with four pastors from <u>Guatemala</u>; however, at the end of June Bill was able to meet with them in person. All four of these pastors are now starting their own DPP groups, while Bill continues to meet with them as a group bi-weekly and individually bimonthly. In addition to that, they've had two Baptist denominations in <u>El Salvador</u> express interest in starting groups there. The movement has gained momentum and meeting in person has given it an extra push.

Face to Face with Seminary Leaders

One of Bill's roles involves consultation aroun theological education. Thanks to colleagues, Bruno and Kathleen Soucy and Byron Velasquez, Bill was able to consult with four different groups of seminary and church leaders in Guatemala and El Salvador. In many parts of the world, seminaries are struggling to recruit students. A possible reason is that what students are learning is not connecting well with the contexts in which they will serve—potential students don't really care for what is being offered and churches don't really care for what graduates have to offer. In short, Bill encouraged them to



consider changing curriculum to better suit their context. Change always meets resistance which can only be overcome by dissatisfaction, vision, and the resources to put the vision into practice. CBM has resources to offer to help leaders and churches to realign their vision and fulfill their purpose in God's kingdom.

Face to Face in Bolivia

Bill and Janice Dyck currently have plans to go to Bolivia from October 25th till November 17th. There will be a two-day retreat around the theme of "A Healthy Pastor." They are expecting about 100 pastors. Bill also looks forward to meeting his small group of leaders, speaking at their home church, Muyurina Baptist Church, and to a retreat and time together with our CBM Latin America team and others who will be coming from our CBM offices in Canada. Janice is looking forward to being with her music students at the Emmanuel Foundation. She will be able to teach the students whom she has already been teaching virtually, in person, for the brief time they will be there. Janice plans to continue teaching her music students from Canada.

Prayer and Praise

- 1) We are thankful Bill and Janice Dyck had a relatively safe and hassle-free trip to Guatemala and El Salvador. Seeds have been planted in relation to DPP and Theological Education—now let's pray they will be nourished and grow

CBM Chinese Ministries

Update from the Team led by Conrad and Fiona Kwok



Needs

There is a great need for financial help and medical workers. The situation in Myanmar is still extremely difficult. High inflation and political unrest affect daily life. Many people have no jobs, and no money to purchase food. There are still shortages of front-line medical workers. A student who graduated from TBTI this year, did not get medical treatment in time. He died of kidney failure. It was very sad; he was only 28 years old. We pray for peace and more resources and skilled medical workers to help where there are critical shortages.

Thailand Bethel Theological Institute supported by CBM and YPBC

Praise the Lord, the school reopened for students to attend in-person classes.

Church Growth, Clean water and Medical Clinics in **Myanmar**

For the Lahu project, CBM and YPBC have helped to achieve the completion of a 5th new church building. In the last five years, 40 villages were visited and 500+ people professed Christ as personal Lord and Saviour.

The Lahu people make their living largely through farming in the remote mountainous regions of Eastern Myanmar. Villages often lack basic facilities such as health clinics and have limited water supplies. With a heart for the Lahu people, Pastor Doudu and his team provide medical help, build up the church and help improve facilities in the remote villages. With a growing number of Christians in Lahu villages, the project addresses the need to

support new Christian communities by building churches and providing pastors to lead and encourage congregations.

Discipleship and Encouraging leaders and students by Zoom and in person

CBM Missionaries Conrad and Fiona Kwok who we support through our donations to the YPBC Mission Fund continue to serve leaders and Chinese speaking students studying in Germany and the far east. With Covid restrictions gradually lifting in the summer of 2022, they have been able to visit both Germany and East Asia, to encourage both leaders and students.. Please pray for Conrad and Fiona and all our staff in the field, for their health, safety, faith, perseverance, and wisdom as they serve our Lord.

Lebanon

Update September 2022

The Mission Fund of YPBC sends financial resources to support the projects of CBM in Lebanon where most needed. Financial gifts from the congregation of our church benefit many children through projects such as Refugee Relief and Camps for Vulnerable Children.



Our gifts also enable the Arab Baptist Theological Seminary to serve teachers, and students in many Arab speaking countries. In 2022, twenty-two new

graduates of ABTS are serving their communities in many different ways.

Here are three examples.

- 1. One graduate of the ABTS Bachelor of Theology course has recently opened a production company that focuses on audiovisual content. The company serves the Moroccan population generally and Christ followers specifically by providing a fully set-up studio where they can use their Godgiven talents to prepare audio-visual content. The couple also organize camps for children and youth. The Art of Teaching course at ABTS helped them create educational resources that suit their culture and context.
- 2. Another 2022 graduate pastors a "spiritual tribe" at Resurrection Church Beirut. Through the church, she serves 150 families with the help of 15 home group leaders.
- 3. A 2022 graduate of Master of Religion in MENA Studies agrees with Billy Graham that one of the next great moves of God is in the workplace and marketplace through believers. Her family has a long history of entrepreneurs; and her education and experience have always been in the business world. Now grounded in Scripture, not man's wisdom, her vision is for her enterprises to have a transformative impact in the countries where they operate; transformation that elevates dignity, alleviates poverty, and helps individuals realize their personal destiny. Her prayer is that God would use these vehicles to carry out His Great Commission.

ABTS, refugees, students and those who provide food, shelter and medical care in Lebanon need our help more than ever. Shortages of food, electricity and fuel are making life very difficult. Please pray for the

AUTUMN: A TIME TO RESPOND



Is this the season to be a n g r y? Aggressive? S a d? Worried? Sarcastic? C u r t? Dismissive? Alternatively, is this

waning-pandemic autumn a time to be reflective? Introspective? Hopeful? Courageous? Gracious? Patient? Kind? Understanding? Thoughtful of others? Forward thinking? And, ultimately, thankful? Last week I made my, ugh, dutiful biweekly run the grocery store. "Ugh," because I love preparing the food. I love eating the food. But as for the hunting and gathering of the food—and the schlepping of it home and packing it away-not so much. I'm mindful that I could use an attitude shift about my petulant loathing of grocery day, and work harder on adjusting my mindset around this task, so that I can eventually profess an authentic positive focus when it come to the mission of fetching the food. I keep reminding myself, when I approach my grocer's threshold, to reset my attitude... to count my blessings that I live in a community and a country where I can quickly drive to a building full of food... and that I have the funds to pay for this sustenance that nourishes my body and soul (provided that I stay away from sinful, calorie-and-fat-laden snack foods, that is!). And let's not forget the blessing of the grand, autumn produce aisle that represents all the hard-working, harvest-time contributions of farmers, big and small, near and far—especially in the late summer and autumn in Ontario. My independent local grocer, like all others at this time of year, is overflowing with the splendour and bounty of the harvest from our blessed "bread basket" of the nation. Basket upon basket, and bushel upon bushel, of apples, peaches, pears and plums; tomatoes, cucumbers, potatoes, peppers, green beans, wax beans, carrots, parsnips, broccoli, cauliflower, eggplant and zucchini! An A-Z cornucopia of abundance!

Knowing that this annual autumn "good and plenty" awaited me last week, I actually found myself excited to "go a-marketing." Still cautious compared to many, I donned my mask, and headed into the fray. In fanfare style, all that pretty produce showed off the minute the sliding doors parted. Oh what a lovely sight; but it was bunched up at the opening, causing the traffic jam of shoppers and carts to begin before even reaching the first little merry-go-round of fresh fruit and vegetable baskets butted-up tightly and neatly against one another, immediately to the left of the doors.

Just ahead of me, two old-friends couples serendipitously bumped into one another. In their delight, they, of course, just *had* to "stop, drop and roll" in place ... standing directly in the way of customers reaching for carts (like someone stopping at the top of a busy moving escalator). All the while, shoppers continued to arrive. I politely apologized—so Canadian of me, lol—begging forgiveness for interrupting their gleeful conversation, so that I could reach a cart. Realizing that they were standing in the way, without any acknowledgement or apology of their own, they shuffled slightly to the left, a little further into the store. Good enough. I was able to grab a cart and begin my "hunt."

As with most shoppers, the first thing I do is head for that fresh, finally-local autumn produce. The same foursome was now loitering in the skinny-isled produce showcase area (shaped like a square carousel). So, yet again, I had to beg their pardon and navigate around the grocery gabbers to reach for fuzzy rosy peaches and little white new potatoes. This time, while doing so, and after involuntarily overhearing their loud one-upmanship about who had the grandest European summer vacation, I was met with a blatantly annoyed look from one of the women. Her expression suggested that I was purposefully stalking them. I said nothing. I quietly continued with my shop, while they continued with their "coffee-clutch chat," moving once again only a little further along the tight aisle (that was barely wide enough for one person with a cart to navigate, let alone four plus one). Within 60 seconds, once again I needed to reach for items that they were blocking. This time the same woman, with the same expression, curtly, shrilly and loudly said, "You, AGAIN???!!"

At such a moment the best within me could have, and should have, found the most gracious and polite of responses to such a brusque, discourteous comment and tone, however, I confess, I missed the mark. I sinned (in the archery-term sense of "sinning"/missing the bull's-eye). On a rudeness scale of one to 10, my retort tone was about a five when I replied, "Well I'm trying to shop here!!!" To that she sarcastically rebutted, "Well we are trying to socialize here!!!" The four of them laughed at her quick and clever comeback, the way the "in crowd" at high school might have done when dismissing an "inconsequential" junior. Funny about that, for these four were seniors, just like me. Pleased with myself for showing restraint and not "getting into it" with them any further, I politely suggested that if they'd only move a few more feet to the right they'd be out of the way of everyone who needed to come through this area to shop. Not just me. They paid no heed—it was as if I hadn't spoken at all. To my credit, I counted to 10, took a deep breath, "shook the dust off my feet" (as we just were reminded in the Scripture Reading of Luke 9: 1-6 on September 11th, and Peter's corresponding sermon, Taking it to the Streets) and continued shopping.

As Victor Frankl reminded, in his book *Man's Search for Meaning* (his profound 1946 volume chronicling his experiences as a prisoner in WW Il Nazi concentration camps; also in which he concluded that there are two kinds of races of people: decent and indecent) between stimulus and response there's a *space*. And in that space one owns the power to *choose*. *No one* can take that power away from you. I chose to hold my tongue.

In terms of the art of assertive communications—especially through times like these, where there's a palpable and heightened sense of incivility "out there"—response choices to conflict interactions, whether large and small, boil down to: non-assertive, assertive or aggressive. Each of these styles has their right time and place. To each one (to borrow from Ecclesiastes 3: 1-8) there's a season (and a reason), depending on the circumstance.

Most people trigger and reply without acknowledgement or respect for that Franklidentified *space* between stimulus and response. That space is anyone's time to contemplate... to *respond* rather than *react*.

Remember biology class, looking under a microscope at a single-celled paramecium or amoeba, where the assignment was to poke at it or introduced a foreign substance and assess how the cell reacted and recoiled? When we allow ourselves to be externally provoked/when we let others steer our course, and then react rather than remember to draw strength from our Lord and respond with the highest value of personal decency, we become just like those single-celled creatures. Totally manipulated by external factors. As though we are being figuratively poked. It's easy to forget to rise above for, as Daniel 2:31-33 reminds, we do have feet of clay. But it's so worth working on one's patience, for the sake of personal deep peace and community harmony.

Here are my three insights from this grocery store episode. What are yours? I hope that you can draw value from these reflections for the next time that you have one of your own day-in-the-life near-clashes with a fellow traveller, decent or otherwise:

- 1. If I actively choose to come from that space of serenity and grace (that we're taught through scripture), I can <u>sit still</u> (or *stand still in a grocery store*, as the case may be, lol), and draw strength from "Pauseland" long enough to *respond* rather than *react*, to any one, in any situation, at any time.
- 2. "React" and "respond" are *not* synonyms. In fact, a good argument can be made that these terms are antonyms.
- 3. Given a conscious choice I suspect everyone would rather respond than react. With the grace and help of God.

REFLECTION - QUEEN ELIZABETH II

Phillip has become a contributor to our Walking Together online devotionals. He wrote the following reflection upon the death of Queen Elizabeth II. We share it with his permission.

Peter

Isaiah 6: 1-5

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said: Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory. The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: 'Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!'"

Reflection

This year will be known by many as, 'the year that Queen Elizabeth died'. Whatever we think about the institution of the monarchy, the death of our Queen has a huge impact upon us.

Her face, her presence, her being there have been part of all our lives for so many years. For most of us, she has been the only monarch we can remember. She has been part of our lives, our imaginations, our sense of who we are.

The writer of this Bible passage from the book of Isaiah shared this experience of the death of a monarch, after a reign of many years. It is probably no co-incidence that it was in this year, the year that King Uzziah died, that he had an experience of the ground shaking beneath him, when the Temple shook and he felt lost.

Many of us now will also feel dislocated and shaken up, in ways we can't quite describe and perhaps hadn't expected.

But the monarch whose reign has just ended in our own land would be the first to say that the God whom she worshipped, and to whom she committed her life in service, the God in whose name she was anointed in a holy place, this holy God, is with us, and the whole earth is filled with God's glory.

There are those who would say that what she provided above all was a kind of stability and reassurance. When times were painful and difficult for us as a nation, she was there. She always sought to comfort the suffering and to steady the anxious.

Above all, her own faith in God was sure and strong. She spoke with increasing depth, in her many Christmas broadcasts, about her own reliance on God. In the face of her death, we can depend on the God who is always with us, filling not only the

temples of this world, but also our families and communities, with love and hope.

In the year that Queen Elizabeth died, we give thanks for a life of dedicated service to our nations and commonwealth. We give thanks for God's faithful servant, Elizabeth. We pray for her family and closest friends, for those who will mourn and miss her most.

We grieve for what we have all lost. And we also take heart and hope from the faith that we shared with her and that she shared with us, remembering that death is defeated and that God reigns above all.

Prayer

O God, our rock and our redeemer, we worship you and give thanks for your servant Queen Elizabeth.

We thank you for her long life and her dedicated service to commonwealth and nations.

We thank you for what she has meant to each one of us...

We treasure memories of meeting herof celebrating and marking moments in her life, of her presence at significant times in our history, and of her speaking to us on radio and television.

We rejoice that she lived and shared the faith we hold and that she followed her vocation, hearing a call to serve.

We pray for those who will miss her most deeply, that they may find comfort and hope.

We celebrate and affirm our faith that death is defeated, that new life awaits your children, and that creation is renewed in Christ.

We pray for our nations at a time of change and for our new King.


May he follow his mother in faithful service and may your blessing rest on him.
