MUSINGS FROM THE MINISTER OF PASTORAL CARE

Carpe diem - seize the day. There is a wonderful scene from the 1989 movie Dead Poets Society. Actor Robin Williams portrays Mr. Keating, an unorthodox English teacher at a private academy for boys. The movie is a period piece set in 1959. The academy is an old school and models its teaching around four pillars: tradition, honour, discipline and excellence. But through his teaching and example, Mr. Keating shows the boys how to think for themselves, and he affirms that they are powerful individuals who should value freedom of expression. In this particular scene, the teacher invites the boys into the hallway on the first day of class. He has them gather around the old school trophy case. He invites them to look at the pictures and awards. They all represent faces from the long ago past. As they peer intently at the pictures, Mr. Keating begins to whisper behind them - carpe diem, carpe diem. The he gets louder and begins to shout "seize the day, boys!" For the rest of the movie, the teacher encourages the boys to find their inner poet, to express themselves uniquely as individuals, and to follow their passions in life.

Carpe diem – seize the day. Many historians attribute this expression to the ancient Roman writer Horace (65 BC to 8 BC). Over the years it has become a descriptive term in literature which urges readers to live for the moment. This theme was especially popular in the 16th and 17th century love poetry. Perhaps these familiar words from the poet Robert Herrick sum up the *carpe diem* philosophy:

"Gather ye rosebuds while ye may, Old time is still a-flying, And this same flower that smiles today, Tomorrow will be dying." A decade ago the movie *The Bucket List* found its way into theatres. It captured one of the more recent fads or novelties out there: the desire to do, experience or accomplish certain things before you die (or before you "kick the bucket"). Sometimes called life lists, these lists contain both simple things (like reconnecting with an old friend or taking a home renovation course) and exotic things (going skydiving or climbing Mount Kilimanjaro).

Some Christians are uncomfortable about using the phrase carpe diem. They are concerned about its ties to the old Epicurean philosophy, or to modern hedonism, which advocates the mantra: "Eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow we may die." However, I believe that Christians are called to live life to the fullest. I don't know what Jesus would think about a "bucket list," but I do know he is concerned about how we live. In John 10:10, he said: "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." The word "life" is used hundreds of times in the Bible. Many of the references include adjectives to describe life: "abundant life, good life, eternal life, a worthy life, long life, full life," and so on. I believe God calls us to live our lives cognizant of his presence and purpose. The scriptures challenge us to live well, to love well and to recognize God in every aspect of creation. One of my favourite authors, Frederick Buechner, in his book Now and Then, put it this way: There is no event so commonplace but that God is present within it, always hiddenly, always leaving you room to recognize him or not to recognize him....Listen to your life. See it for the fathomless mystery that it is. In the boredom and pain of it no less than in the excitement and gladness; touch, taste, smell your way to the heavenly and hidden heart of it because in the last analysis all moments are key moments, and life itself is grace."

The singer and composer George Beverly Shea was a fixture at Billy Graham Crusades for many years. Shea was actually born in Winchester, Ontario and died in 2013 at the age of 104. One of his signature songs speaks of the wonder of God's love, and living for God's glory: There's the wonder of sunset at evening, The wonder as sunrise I see; But the wonder of wonders that thrills my soul Is the wonder that God loves me.

There's the wonder of springtime and harvest, The sky, the stars, and the sun; But the wonder of wonders that thrills my soul Is a wonder that's just begun.

O, the wonder of it all! The wonder of it all! Just to think that God loves me. O, the wonder of it all! The wonder of it all! Just to think that God loves me.

Today I invite you to experience abundant life – to live life to the fullest as God intended. More than anything else, this is not based on outward circumstances but on an attitude of the heart. So go ahead – *carpe diem* – seize the day for God.

HARNESSING SERENDIPITY

This Summer and Always

...you don't reach Serendipity by plotting a course for it. You have to set out in good faith for elsewhere and lose your bearings... serendipitously.

— John Barth, The Last Voyage of Somebody the Sailor

When I reflect on my career path, I whole-heartedly acknowledge *serendipity*—or put another way, "God moments"—God's gentle hand nudging me in a different direction, whether or not I consciously heeded the call. I certainly wasn't *planning* a career as a speaker and writer, but that's exactly what happened. Twenty-two years ago the death of my mother prompted me to make haste in a new direction. How about you? What seemingly serendipitous events through the years have led you to "parts unknown" or unpredicted?

Consider these definitions below. Just how much serendipity has played a part in *your* destiny, in the beginning of your earliest of adult years, and through all the time since?

The Oxford Dictionary declares serendipity as: "The faculty of making happy and unexpected discoveries." Wikipedia's definition: "...the effect by which one accidentally discovers something fortunate, especially while looking for something else entirely." And Chambers Dictionary of Etymology shares that serendipity was coined in 1754 by English author Horace Walpole (from the Persian fairy tale, Three Princes of Serendip, whose heroes "were always making discoveries by accident and sagacity, of things they were not in quest of.") As a sidebar, "Serendip" was an old name for Ceylon (Sri Lanka), deriving from the ancient Arabic name "Sarandib." Walpole went on to explain that the princes' ability to manifest "accidental sagacity" and good fortune was closely related to their intelligence, cleverness, and reasoning.

So then, with Walpole's further explanation in mind, along with thanks to God, credit a little serendipity for some of your good fortune and destiny through the years, by way of acknowledging your own sagacity. By this I mean gifted discernment, acutemindedness, practical wisdom, intelligence, cleverness, reasoning, powers of observation, and willingness to take action on what presents before you. *All* of these gifts and skills have helped you get where you are today.

What wonderful opportunities have come your way when you least expected? What treasured people have entered (or re-entered, after many years absence) your life thanks to serendipity? What discoveries have you made, *serendipitously*?

Here are five serendipitous discoveries to muse:

1. Silly Putty: By James Wright, on the way to solving another problem: finding a rubber substitute for the United States during World War II.

2. Penicillin: By Alexander Fleming. He failed to disinfect cultures of bacteria when leaving for his vacation, only to find them contaminated with Penicillium moulds, which killed the bacteria.

3. Law of Gravity: Thanks to Sir Isaac Newton's contemplation of the famed apple falling from a tree, his musing about the nature of gravitation was born.

4. X rays: By Wilhelm Roentgen. Interested in investigating cathodic ray tubes, he noted that some fluorescent papers in his lab were illuminated at a distance although his apparatus had an opaque cover.

5. The first European to see the coast of North America was reputedly Bjarni Herjolfsson, who was blown off course by a storm in 985 or 986 while trying to reach Greenland.

Here's one of my own serendipitous tales:

I'd never met any of my English family until my mum, Beryl, died. On my first trip to England after her passing, I met my mum's little sister, Kay (who was only 11 years old when my mum emigrated to Canada in 1953). Kay had been heavy-hearted for 40 years that she'd never met her big sister as an adult. She remembered with great affection, and a little melancholy too, the day my mum took her on a day trip to Windsor, to tell her she was going to Canada forever. Kay recounted that my mum shared this heartbreaking news while crossing the footbridge over the Thames, which joined Windsor with Eton. During my visit I asked my aunt to take me to that bridge (a place she hadn't visited since that sad day long ago). As we approached, I could feel our moods changing, getting quiet. We reached the crest of the bridge and took a few moments of quiet reflection, looking down at the water, as pleasure boats passed underneath on that golden, glowing July evening. And what do you think happened *next*? A beautiful pleasure craft passed under, with the word "Beryl" painted on it's back!!! *My* mummy/*Kay*'s beloved, "lost" sister there with us... floating right by—happily sailing into the literal sunset, her skipper broadly waving and smiling as we stood atop, gobsmacked (as the British like to say). Or more apropos, lovingly, gently and serenely *God*smacked. ;) A serendipitous "God moment" at its very finest, indeed. Maybe *serendipity* is really just a synonym for *God intervention/God moment*. Or would that be the *other* way around???

Summer is a picture-perfect time for opening up to some serendipity of your own. How might *you* make some happy and unexpected/accidental discoveries, or fortunately bump up against something (or someone), while looking for something *else*?

Here are five "miracle grow" suggestions for planting seeds to encourage your own summer of serendipity:

1. Set Aside Some Quiet Time in Nature Every Day: Fertilize your thoughts. Let your mind have some regularly scheduled quiet nature time this summer—even if only in your back garden, balcony, or local park—so your "brilliant ideas" can rise, allowing lurking serendipity to follow. Getting quiet, even for only ten minutes a day—cuts out the chatter and white noise of daily life that will allow you to *hear* the creative and fortunate ideas you may have been trying to tell yourself for years (but perhaps were "too busy" to acknowledge).

2. Keep Your Calm: Extra stress and anger can "blind" you to what's present and available. Serendipitous opportunities may be dancing all around you and you'll never notice if you're too stressed or angered. It's a scientific fact... counting to ten when irritated really *does* help to keep you grounded and calm; your primitive brain flies off the handle and reacts in split seconds when presented with negative stimulus, but your *higher* thinking/ more evolved brain centre responds more productively and positively if even a small amount of time, e.g., ten seconds, lapses *before* responding.

3. Be First to Reach Out: Be the one who extends the helping hand to another *first*, sincerely, and without profit or expectation. Be the one who says "yes"—the one who invites, who shares info, reveals

and self-discloses. Oftentimes, once *you* do, the *other* naturally follows suit—and from *there* serendipity may flow.

4. Keep An Open Heart: Although it may be true that *some* people may use your kindness against you, focus on the potential, serendipitous benefits of an open, trusting heart. The benefits of such a heart outweighs the disadvantages–especially when it comes to facilitating yourself to be ready to receive good things not sought after.

5. Take a Honest Summertime Inventory of Your Strengths and Weaknesses, Belief Systems, Behaviours, and Blind spots: Even though the experience of serendipity is, by definition, *not* expected, you *can* prepare yourself for the surprise of this good fortune more readily if you sincerely know these truths about your personal inventory. An honest personal inventory allows more of your authentic self to surface. The blessing of serendipitous doors swing open more easily and frequently with greater personal clarity.

Such blessings and "magic" are out there for us to experience *every* day—all around us. Like fish swimming in water and not knowing what "water" *is*! *We* are *swimming in it*! We know this *intellectually*, but still so often miss the cues. So then, take a hint; be on high alert this summer. Keep an eye out, an ear to the ground, and a heart open, too, to make *this* summer *your* best, most rewarding summer of serendipity ever. I look forward to hearing the amazing "unbelievable" stories we'll share with one another come September, when we are all back together again! Happy days, and blessings to all, while enjoying your lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer.

REFUGEE SPONSORSHIP UPDATE

On April 12 we welcomed Hayan and Abir and their two daughters (4 and 2 years old) who were taking refuge in Lebanon after escaping the war in Syria. On May 17 we welcomed Hayan's sister Fatma, her husband Mohamed and daughter (4 years old). Hayan's and Fatma's parents live in Thorncliffe Park and are taking on most of the resettlement work. They are very grateful for the congregation's support and they hope to be able to express that at a reception at the Church on June 23.

Other families are waiting in the wings. Two young Eritreans, persecuted because of their Christian faith, and taking refuge in Ethiopia, have recently had their immigration interviews. A Pakistani family of four, persecuted because of their Christian faith and taking refuge in Thailand, are awaiting a decision after their recent interview. We have funds or committed pledges to cover their sponsorship costs.

Still unfunded however are the following: a Syrian family, persecuted because of their Christian faith taking refuge in Lebanon; and the half-brother and his family of Charlene and Chancella, victims of the violence between Christians and Moslems in the Central African Republic, taking refuge in a camp in Ghana.

The funding gap, based on a cost of \$40,000 per family, is about \$80,000. The Refugee Program will not be appealing to the congregation for these funds in view of the many financial challenges the Church is facing. Thank you for your support!
