# FROM PETER'S PEN MANY LANGUAGES – ONE FAITH

Yorkminster Park has what is now a wellestablished tradition on Pentecost Sunday of reading the first twenty-one verses of Acts chapter two with twenty-one different

readers each reading one verse in their mother tongue. Each reader begins by saying their name, country of origin and language and then they read their assigned verse.

There must be close to fifty different languages spoken by members of our church family and with each passing year this number only seems to increase. Fifteen plus years ago when we first started this exercise there was a predominance of various European languages. There were a few Asian voices but year after year only one African and one or two South-Asians. This year our readers identified the following countries of origin, Albania, India, Liberia, Ghana, Egypt, Brazil, Romania, China, Pakistan, Estonia, Quebec, Nigeria, Japan, Iran, Uganda, Hong Kong, and Cote d'Ivoire. Needless to say, there are many other countries and languages represented in the Yorkminster Park church family.

I have often thought of the practice as a symbolic re-enactment of what had happened in Acts chapter two when the Holy Spirit came on the apostles in the Upper Room and sent them out into the streets of Jerusalem which were crowded with pilgrims from around the world. The pilgrims from many places heard the disciples preaching the gospel in the tongues of far-away places. God was speaking to them in their own language! Our Pentecost reading is indeed a profound reminder of what it must have been like on the Day of Pentecost, but I have come to believe it is far more for us than a symbolic re-enactment.

In recent years, our church has become home to new Canadians from many lands across Africa, the Middle East, South Asia, South and Central America and Europe. The various voices and languages

we hear on Pentecost Sunday are not just a sign of what once was. These same voices also bear witness to what is a marvelous gift and sign of the power and presence of God in our midst.

Paula Willis visited one of our members in hospital this week and they reported to her that they were viewing the service live in their hospital room on Sunday when a medical attendant entered the room at the precise moment Mary Edwards identified herself as being from Egypt and read a verse in Arabic. The attendant stopped and listened and then said aloud, "I am from Egypt. Will you please pray for me."

God has gifted us with people from the far corners of the world who in their witness and service make us so much stronger as we seek to do the work of Christ in this world. The Holy Spirit is in our midst calling us to open our doors and hearts to a whole new world and it is marvelous in our ears and in our eyes!

# Matthew House Initiative helps refugees succeed

Matthew House is one of our major ministry partners. It has been helping refugees make Canada their new home for many years. It is driven by Jesus' call in Matthew 25:35 to feed, clothe, shelter, and serve our global neighbours in need.

It's a two-way street. Refugees give back. One has developed a unique simulated hearing program to help other refugees prepare for their hearing with the Immigration and Refugee Board of Canada (IRB).

Refugee claimants arrive at our border without sponsors or status, seeking the protection of Canada. Currently there is no official system in place to welcome or assist them. They are greatly in need of help at many levels. One key area is with respect to preparing for their refugee hearing with the IRB.

# The Most Important Day

A refugee claimant's hearing at the IRB is one of the most important days of their life. If they fail this hearing, they are at risk of being deported back to their country of origin, where they face persecution. While they are entitled to the help of a lawyer, legal aid can be challenging to access and few have the opportunity to truly practice before their hearing takes place.

Developed by a former refugee applicant **RE-COURSE** is a free program that provides refugee claimants with an opportunity to practice through a simulated hearing. The program is entirely virtual. It mimics the conditions of the IRB hearing itself.

Participants report feeling more confident and capable after practicing with **RE-COURSE** volunteers, regardless of the outcome of their hearing.

#### Says one refugee participant:

I would like to take a moment to express my heartfelt gratitude to Matthew House Toronto for their invaluable support during the pre-hearing process. Their guidance and resources were instrumental in helping me prepare thoroughly and confidently.

I am thrilled to share some wonderful news – my claim received an instant decision and has been approved! This positive outcome would not have been possible without the assistance and encouragement from Matthew House.

Thank you for making such a meaningful difference in my journey. I hope this message inspires others to seek out their support, as it truly makes a difference.



# To Everything There is a Season-Ecclesiastes 3 Says it So Right

Sometimes you just need to change. Right? That's what we have now! Summer! Finally! We are so pleased to announce that **The Rev. Dr. Anna Robbins** has agreed to be our Women's Retreat facilitator next year on **Saturday February 21, 2026**, a day apart to which all women are warmly invited.

Anna is familiar to us at Yorkminster Park as well as to many within our wider Baptist community as she has preached at our church, has served as a keynote speaker at the Lester Randall Preaching Fellowship in 2017 and has been a plenary speaker for one of our Canadian Baptists of Ontario and Quebec annual Assemblies.

She is committed to engaging with real life issues and world challenges in their relationships with justice and from the perspective of faith. Accordingly, Anna is passionate about helping Christians understand and communicate their faith well in our contemporary context. She has earned an international profile in theology and apologetics, ethics and contemporary culture and is sought after as a speaker and teacher.

Anna came to faith at a young age in St. John, New Brunswick and completed a Bachelor of Arts (Political Science) at Carleton University in 1989, later graduating from Acadia University with a Master of Religious Education in 1993 and a Master of Arts (Theology) in 1997. She served churches as an ordained minister of the Canadian Baptists of Atlantic Canada.

Near the end of her doctoral studies in Wales (PhD 2001), she was appointed to the faculty

of the London School of Theology (United Kingdom) where she served for 12 years as a teacher and academic leader. In London, Anna was also a theological consultant to several organizations and served on the council of the Baptist Union of Great Britain. Her research graduates serve in diverse teaching and leadership positions around the world.

In 2012, she returned to Nova Scotia with her family to join the faculty at Acadia Divinity College, since 2019, Anna has served as President of Acadia Divinity College and Dean of Theology of Acadia University. She also holds the Dr. Millard R. Cherry Chair of Theology, Ethics and Culture, serves on the Board of Directors of the Association of Theological Schools and is the Director of the Andrew MacRae Centre for Faith and Culture for which she regularly blogs.

Anna continues to write, travel and speak widely with a passion to help people engage well with matters of contemporary culture and faith. She lives in Wolfville with her husband Peter and their teenage son David.



## Let's Choose the Better Path by Suzanne Wilkinson

"Travel is fatal to prejudice, bigotry, and narrow-mindedness." – Mark Twain. As I reflect on my travels, including the blessing of three visits to Israel with groups of pilgrims, I am reminded of several unique aspects of humanity's history and the origins of faith that are intertwined with the history of that tiny yet pivotal country of Israel, which God has set apart since the beginning.

Today, our world is engulfed in a relentless cycle of wars and rumours of wars, with many regions bearing the brunt of this catastrophic, unnecessary loss of life, reflecting unspeakable atrocities. The urgency of our response to these crises cannot be overstated. As Christians, we are called to pray and act swiftly to restore peace and justice and rebuild lives. Has evil, which necessitates war, caused humanity to stop reasoning together?

God created humans with a higher intellect than animals. Were we not made in God's image? "We thank You, Lord, for the incredible capacity to reason and feel." These are God-given distinctions, yet where have they gone for many? Sadly, division, spreading hatred, untruths and conflict seem to have erupted almost globally. This lack of understanding and the proliferation of negativity cause polarizing feelings, starkly contrasting with the love we are called to show as part of our faith.

Humankind can create robotics, travel to the moon, and develop artificial intelligence, yet we struggle to get along with one another. God has endowed us with the capacity to love, care, and empathize, but where can these qualities be found in so many today? Are these attributes diminishing? Sin, pride, hatred, injustice, and selfishness obstruct our path. Let us cry out for these God-given distinctions.

Lord, restore Your wisdom, love, and empathy within us before we destroy ourselves and the planet that sustains us. Amen



Today, many struggle to empathize with the countless innocent Israelis, Palestinians, Iranians, Ukrainians, and starving Africans caught in the chaos of ruthless decisions and war. Bombs continue to devastate hospitals, homes, and landscapes in many global conflict hotspots. While marches can be constructive and necessary, some have evolved into ugliness, focusing solely on the suffering of one side. Too often, the child bleeding on an unattended stretcher in a dusty tunnel is neglected. Can we not look into the eyes of the helpless and recognize those trapped in an age-old conflict that seems irreconcilable?

I recall the time I met a Palestinian family who had lost all their earthly possessions in a bombing, and a deep sense of empathy and shared humanity swelled up in me. How would I have handled life had that been me? Yesterday, when I entered a store, a well-dressed

man with skin darker than mine was exiting. He said, "Your smile was the only one I received all day." These encounters are heartbreaking.

Are we losing the ability to experience another's pain? Can we no longer reason together and love our neighbours as Jesus commanded? Are we so desensitized and unsure of the truth promoted by specific news channels and persuaded by our bias that many have tuned out, choosing to disengage from the overwhelming flood of information?

Holy Spirit of God, help us discern what we watch, read, or hear from others, so we can decipher what is true about what is happening in our world. Amen



We need to pray for God's help, for without it, I fear humanity is losing the capacity to care, to recognize that the suffering child is not merely a "Palestinian," "Jewish," or "Ukrainian" child but a child in pain. We must understand that the person sleeping on that downtown street is someone's daughter, addicted to drugs. Hatred and division permeate our world and there appears to be a lack of understanding and love. Have hatred, vengeance, and revenge overshadowed loving compassion and understanding? Are we not taught in the Scriptures to "love our neighbour as ourselves" (Mark 12:31)? Is the connection to and understanding of another's pain not the essence of our shared humanity? Let us not lose this mysterious power, this bond with our fellow humans, whoever they may be. It is not just about loving our neighbour; it is about recognizing that we are all part of the same human family, bound by our shared humanity. Thus, shared humanity should unite us, not divide us.

Why do we consider ourselves superior and more deserving than others? Why does greed hold such controlling and insatiable power that it causes the innocent and needy to starve and even die? Yes, it is a sin, but can we not acknowledge the values and rights of others to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness?

Is empathizing with those in need no longer part of being human? When we see an injured, starving child, an oppressed, homeless person, impoverished and struggling, or a senior lacking resources, do we ignore them and turn away?

Where is our compassion for those near and far, regardless of their skin colour or creed? Do we ever ask ourselves, "Who is our neighbour?" Do we need to revisit the story of the Good Samaritan? (Luke 10:25-37). Let's challenge ourselves to become today's Good Samaritans. Empathy is more than just feeling sorry for those suffering; it requires us to understand their pain, acknowledge their struggles, and act to help alleviate their burdens. It is a vital, God-given gift that we can share. We must not underestimate its power to transform lives and create a more compassionate world. Empathy is not a luxury; it is a necessity that allows us to connect with

others, uplift them, encourage their spirits, and remind them of their worth as children of God.

Pray to God that we may see the innocent faces of children and their parents murdered while they slept or sense the fears of youth. Care for those who sit today as hostages or the innocent who have lost all they once considered normal. Pray for the lonely senior or the tremor-bound Parkinson's victim. Recognizing their situations should evoke our pain and drive us to prayer. Let us pray to Almighty God for a resurgence of His agape love for reconciled humanity and faith for a hopeful future that includes 'love of neighbour.' The challenge goes out to Christians and citizens alike to pray and care. In one way or another, we are all formed in the image of God. Let us be those to whom the Lord God grants the hope of glory through His Son, which encompasses justice, mercy, understanding, and kindness. Help us not to become thoughtless, unfeeling, or robotic beings. May wisdom and empathy be embedded in our very essence.

Loving Lord, please teach and guide us in ways that show others Your love and understanding. May the 'love of neighbour' reign supreme on this earth as was Your design for all humanity from the beginning. Amen

Jesus showed us how; let us be His faithful followers.

# "Into the Clearing"

Hugh Alcock September 13 to October 30, 2025 Opening reception: Sunday, September 14, 12:30 – 2:00pm

YP Gallery is looking forward to welcoming artist **Hugh Alcock** to the gallery for a solo show this fall. "Into the Clearing" will run from September 13 to October 30, 2025, with an opening reception scheduled for Sunday, September 14, after church. In his Artist's Statement, Alcock states that he wants to "showcase nature, to celebrate it in its own right – especially trees which fascinate me. Trees have a quiet presence that



is often overlooked. When you do pay attention to them, you are captivated by their endlessly varied forms. Their appearances are in constant flux, changing with the time of day and the seasons." He goes on to state that "Always I am mindful of how in situ all our senses are active, and I hope the viewer not only sees the image in front of them, but listens out for the rustle of the trees, smells the fragrances in the air and feels the spikiness all around, or perhaps the cold ground underfoot."

Paying attention is at the core of Hugh Alcock's work. He produces large intricately detailed drawings of trees and forests. They are full of carefully recorded organic minutia. The forest is the subject of these images but it's the geometric detail that is Alcock's true focus. In these drawings, we follow the artist's observations of the precise bend of each curving line within each forking branch. We watch as he outlines each burl and crevice in the textured bark. With marks of charcoal and chalk, the artist is showing us what he sees.

Though born in British Columbia, Hugh grew up in England. On returning to Canada he attended the Ontario College of Art, including one year in its program in Florence, Italy. Hugh later trained as a philosopher, teaching for many years. In the last decade or so Hugh has returned to making art on a serious basis. He also writes regular art reviews for Art Toronto (artoronto.ca) and is involved in the promotion of independent artists. Hugh lives with his wife, Beth, in Toronto.


